I hope the New Year finds you safe, happy and healthy. The website looks terriffic. Great job. The archived newsletters are great too. It was fun to read some of the issues that came out before I was an owner. Thanks for putting that together.

I don't have much to report. I did complete three major projects on Angelsea during 2001. I put in new plumbing, seacocks, etc. That was fun. I also finished all exterior teak; stripped to bare wood, cleaned, sanded, then applied ten coats of Bristol Finish. I'll let you know if the Bristol Finish works any better than varnish. Finally, I finished installing a new Yanmar 1GM10. She had one years ago but the previous owner had it removed and had glassed back in the shaft. I ground the prop area back out, put in a new shaft, cutlass bearing, pss shaft seal, engine, exhaust, seacock for cooling intake, new diesel tank, etc. Big project, took two and a half months to complete. It is wonderful to turn a key and be able to steam back home because of my schedule. It is also nice not to be lugging that heavy Yamaha 9.9 Longshaft outboard on the stern.

We have had pretty decent weather in the southeast until last week. My wife, and my two daughters Tara 6 and Rachel 3, went out sailing in 18kt winds (lot for us) on Christmas Eve. That was fun - it was great because we haven't really had a day with that much wind since the springtime.

I have plans to trailer *Angelsea* down to Florida this spring and do some coastal cruising or possibly run over to the Bahamas. We'll see. Problem is getting enough time away from work to make it worth the effort. If anyone is ever in Atlanta let me know, I'd love to meet up with any owners and go sailing.
