Dear Falmouth Owners & Friends:

We all owe Paul Christensen, the past editor of the Falmouth Cutter Newsletter a hardy thanks and best wishes for the time, effort and expense he endured while keeping us informed of fellow FC owners comings, goings and ideas. Paul served us from September 1982 to March 1986.

I wrote to Sam in late October to see if anyone had stepped forward to pick up where Paul left off. Sam advised that the job was open, So I told Sam I would have a go at it for awhile to see if the FC Owners wanted the newsletter to continue. – I'm giving you early warning, I'm a poor writer and even worse speller - so - please laugh with and not at me in my communications attempts.

The mailing list Sam sent has thirty three names. Seven on the list are owners of Lyle Hess' beautiful Nor'Sea 27. I want to encourage all of you....please keep me advised of you cruising plans and reports of accomplished voyages. These sailing yarns are the spice that keep a sailors heart pumping as well as fuel to keep long delayed and revered type cruising dreams alive and well. If any of you are like myself, 90% of our time goes to earning bread, raising kids and paying bills – ah, but the beautiful 10% plus – hopefully, is spent seeking the pleasure and freedom of sailing...to a real paradise... someday.

I have been working with various methods of "sheet to tiller" self steering encouraged by reading of John Letcher's success. Did you have a self steering vane? If so, what kind? What problems did you encounter on the voyage that might be helpful to other FC owners if they could learn from your experience? How did your FC perform? What was your average miles made good? - Yours is a great accomplishment Jim – I'm sure you'll have an eager audience if you can find the time to tell us of your voyage.

Bob Davey "Pony" FC#16 made a successful crossing of the Gulf of Mexico last year. Galveston to Florida's west coast. (I forgot Bob's port of call). Bob had a steering vane that performed well – even in some high winds and heavy seas. I remember him telling me that once he got over the shock of the noise, high seas and rough motion, he could tell his little ship was carrying on just fine. Bob advised that "Pony" sailed herself under sty'sl only during prolonged winds of 30 knots plus. With an inexperienced crew of one, Bob really single handed the trip as his unfortunate crew was seasick and holding his world together from the floor of the cabin. While the weather conditions were much worse than Bob dreamed would be his lot, he said he would do it again as "Pony" won his confidence.

It was a brief sail on "Pony" in Bob's home port of Dallas' on Lake Ray Hubbard several years ago that motivated Jeannine and I to invest in FC#23 "Seabird". It was during that sail that Bob shared with me his dream of sailing "Pony" across the Gulf of Mexico. With that significant achievement accomplished, Bob wrote a poem, "Bearing Away". The poem points to the struggle of finding the time, the place and the space to, "join the world of sailors...and believers!" - A copy of Bob's poem is enclosed.
